## Been There, Done That

### Split

In picture above, Pat and I are standing in the large of sign of Split, Croatia, that is down by the waterfront. Notice the Christmas trees and the fact that we are bundled up. That's because it was December of last year, and it was cold!

Split is Croatia's second largest city. It sits about halfway down the Dalmatian coast on the Adriatic Sea. The main attraction in Split is Diocletian's Palace, built back in the 4th Century for the Roman Emperor Diocletian. Half of the old town section of Split is comprised of his palace and at one time, thousands of people lived in the old-town section.

Some of the buildings, including a cathedral built during the Roman era, are still standing. They are some of the most valuable surviving buildings of that time. The picture below shows part of the wall surrounding old town Split.



The strip of three stamps is Croatia Scott #236a-c, issued on April 20, 1995. The first stamp shows a drawing of the reconstruction of the palace of Diocletian, the second stamp is a painting of Split harbor from 1937 by Emanuel Vidovic and the third stamp is a modern view of Split.

## Topic of the Month:

### "National Something Month (Ice Cream)"

President Reagan dedicated July to be "National Ice Cream Month" (and with the 3rd Sunday of the month being "National Ice Cream Day" as a public law on July 9, 1984 with Presidential Proclamation 5219.

Here then is the USA stamp featuring a "Hot Fudge Sundae" from a series of "Soda Fountain Favorites" stamps from a booklet issued in 2016 (which for some reason wasn't available at the local post office ...).

Hot Fudge Sundaes generally feature vanilla (or vanilla "flavored") ice cream, hot fudge (but sometimes also chocolate syrup) and a cherry on top as shown on the stamp. Of course this can all be modified to suit your needs ... whipping cream and nuts are also favorite add-ons.

The exact origin of ice cream is unknown and probably goes back to Roman days, as it was said that Emperor Nero enjoyed ice flavored with honey. Early US Presidents also had a liking for ice cream. Vanilla is the most popular flavor (although personally I tend heavily towards "Jamocho Almond Fudge" from a certain ice cream chain that has 33 flavors...).

This could be a fun topic to explore more in-depth, perhaps as part of a dairy products collection or exhibit!

**Plitvice Lakes**

The Plitvice Lakes National Park is Croatia's most beautiful National Park. It is also the largest and one of the oldest parks in Croatia. Additionally, it is also a UNESCO World Heritage Site.



It covers 73,350 acres near the eastern border with Bosnia-Herzegovina. In the park are a series of waterfalls and sixteen terraced lakes as well as a dense forest. In picture one you can see some of the waterfalls and a lake. A variety of birds and animals such as the European brown bear, wolves, eagles, owls, lynx and wild cats make their home in the park.

While on our walking tour, I was glad that we didn't see any bears, wolves or lynx, since I can't run as fast as when I

was younger! We did see some ducks on one of the lakes though.

Pat and I were at the park in December 2017 on our trip to the Balkans. Picture



two shows the exterior of the Jezero Hotel located in the park. This is where we stayed while there. Notice the snow in the parking lot, after all it was December. Walking through the park was no problem since the paths were clear of snow. One of the Plitvice Lakes water falls is shown on the enclosed stamp booklet, which is Croatia #685a-j and was issued on April 25, 2008.



Welcome to another episode of "TV Philately", where via the miracle of the "Pause" button, we can see if they "got it right" when it comes to displaying stamps, postmarks and other philatelic elements on the big (& little) screen!

This time, it's the movie "Mechanic: Resurrection", a thriller that was released in 2016 and stars Jason Statham (as a master assassin) and Jessica Alba. Towards the end of the movie, one of the characters is in Thailand and has received a postcard from Cambodia.

At a quick glance, all appears ok, but it isn't! What appears to be a Cambodian stamp on the postcard, doesn't actually exist. I checked Scott's and stampworld.com and could not find a stamp with a design that matched this.

Even the "cancel" isn't real, since it's not a cancel! It's a postage meter (evident by the inscription to the right of the circle). It wouldn't make sense to have a "stamp" on the postcard and then have it be "canceled" with a meter! At the International Postage Meter website at <https://www.wikibooks.org>, I found what appears to be the match for the movie prop.

And yet again, they failed to provide a convincing piece of on-screen philately!

## Being Internet Savvy

If you study your stamps, one of the must-have tools is a UV lamp. Actually "lamps", as there are both shortwave and long wave UV lamps out there as various stamps react to one or the other. While the "Lighthouse" (Leuchturn) sells some of these from \$29 to \$69 each; they invariably come from China these days and I have been able to buy some via [www.aliexpress.com](http://www.aliexpress.com) (a marketplace of different sellers in China). Many offer free shipping!

You'll find lots of UV lamps for sale there, but to find them you'll need to search for UV lamps and many of these will be described as aiding in currency / banknote checking and urine detection and watermark detectors. You can easily find many of these for well under \$10, you'll just have to wait 10 to 30 days to get it in the mail.

## Meghdoot Post Cards of India

Meghdoot means “Cloud-Messenger” and these postal cards were introduced by the Indian Post Office on September 2, 2002. While normal postal cards cost 50 paise (about 37c) to mail, these cards cost users only half that due to the address side being so ld by the Indian Post for advertising.


Looking in the Internet under “Meghdoot Post Cards” I found such diverse advertising as “Plastic Paper Pollution”; Private Toilets Sanitation; Panchayat Raj Celebration; Reserve Bank of India; Noorul Islam University, Coffee Plantations and Petroleum Conservation Research Association.

The users must order a minimum of 100,000 cards of each type of advertisement and I found that they could target their addressees by the various dialects found in India. Examples found: Tamil; Oriya; English, Hindi Meitei, Bhabha and a dozen or so others. The cost of the ads are 0.2 Reals each, or about ¾ cent each. The cards are printed in sheets of 8 cards, although some have been supplied to post offices in sheets of 4 and pairs of just 2 cards. The advertisers determine the areas of distribution as well as the design and text. In addition to the post offices in the area of its distribution, the Meghdoot is also made available in limited quantity of 2,000 cards at 8 selected philatelic bureaus that handle postal stationery.

Each of India Post’s 23 Postal Circles (possibly something like minor postal headquarters) can place their orders directly to the press to decentralize the efforts. However, all other postal stationery with advertisements, such as the regular Post Cards, Inland Letter Cards, Aerogrammes and Envelopes are printed only by the national Postal Directorate in New Delhi.

Meghdoot Post Cards are available as either single cards or paid reply post cards for use within India only. One collector in India boasts of having a collection of 604 Meghdoot postcards in 15 different national languages.

Shown are three of the 12 varieties of Meghdoots which were printed in 2008 for the State AIDS Control of Karnataka on November 1, 2008. These were printed in the Kannada language.

## Personal Computers

In college in the early 1980’s, I took a couple of computer programming courses (Fortran, Advanced Fortran and Assembly Language) and eventually decided that “programming” wasn’t really “it” (ha, ha) for me. Ok, back then “IT” (“information technology”) as a term had not been coined yet.

At the time, programming meant putting each line of the program on a “punch card”, done on a machine the size of a large desk, then taking it to another machine to read the program, then wait a while for the results to spit out on a line printer. Running a simple program would cost several dollars on the mainframe!

Jump forward to 1987 or so. After college, I spent a year (1986) in Switzerland, learning the ropes on my new job. Once I returned to the USA (in our company’s new facility in Shelbyville, Kentucky [home of “Col. Sanders” of KFC fame...]), I was told to learn how to use a “PC”. Back then, I didn’t know a floppy from a hole in my head! I basically had to teach myself about word processing, spreadsheets and databases. There was no Microsoft Word or Excel at that time (that I remember), the big software applications at the time were “Framework”, “Enable”, “Lotus123” and “WordPerfect” and “Geoworks Ensemble”.

The machines we got to use were either IBM PS2 model 30’s (similar to what’s pictured on the “Celebrate-the-Century”



stamp above) or a clone; these machines had either one or two floppy drives (5.25” and/or 3.5”), a “monochrome” 12” monitor and if you were lucky, a 20 MB (yes “megabyte”, not “gigabyte”) hard drive. The machines were running DOS and you had to know how to maneuver around with the use of a mouse or even menu (batch files came in handy, and so did remember a slew of keyboard shortcuts)! I managed to buy my own PC for use at home at that time; it was a Packard Bell, had a color “CGA” monitor, dual floppy drives and a whopping 30 MB hard drive (50% bigger than what I had at work!), and I think it cost a whopping \$1,700 at the time. Oh yeah, and a screeching dot matrix printer to go with it...

The picture above shows me at my PC in 1988 at Aluisse Flexible Packaging in the QC lab at that I worked in as a Quality Engineer (utilizing my Packaging Engineering degree).

## Flea Market Stamps

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
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## Kotor, Montenegro

## From the President's Desk

In the picture below, Pat & I are standing outside the main gate to the old walled town of Kotor, Montenegro. We went there on a one-day outing from Dubrovnik, Croatia in December 2017 while visiting the Balkan nations.



Kotor is a UNESCO World Heritage Site dubbed the natural and cultural-historic region of Montenegro. It is a coastal town on the Adriatic Sea, situated at one of the most indented parts of the Adriatic. It is considered the southern most fjord in Europe, however, it is referred to as a "via", which is a submerged river canyon.

The surrounding fortifications date from the Venetian period. In 1389, the Ottoman Turks defeated the Serbs at the battle of Kosovo Polje. Local nobles then ruled Montenegro on behalf of the Ottomans until 1516. At that time, Serbian Orthodox bishops began ruling parts of Montenegro until the late 1700's. At that time, they took control of all of Montenegro. Finally in 1852, a ruler took the title of prince. The Congress of Berlin recognized an independent Montenegro in 1878. Prince Nicholas, who took the throne in 1860 became king in 1910. Montenegro remained independent until December 12, 1918 when it joined the other Balkan states and formed the Kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, which then became Yugoslavia.

In 1992, after Slovenia, Croatia, Bosnia and Macedonia declared their independence, Montenegro joined with Serbia to a smaller Yugoslavia. In 2003, a new constitution changed the name to Serbia and Montenegro. Finally in 2006, Montenegro and Serbia separated into independent nations.

We all have our own reasons for collecting postage stamps, covers or postcards (which can now be entered in stamp exhibits or as a 'stand alone' exhibit. We could have collected coins, or matchbooks covers, or feathers, or any of a thousand items to collect. But why did YOU decide to collect stamps and why? Could you write a paragraph or two for this newsletter to explain what the prompt was that got you into this great hobby of ours? It could be interesting whether it was a parent, uncle, grandparent, or childhood friend that got you started. Maybe you were catching and mounting butterflies or collecting baseball trading cards that for some reason triggered the interest in our fantastic hobby.

In my case my boyhood interest in collecting stamps from ages 8 to 17 tied together my interest in science fiction, primarily the Flash Gordon serials that were on TV in the early 1950's – along with the Jules Verne novel, "From the Earth to the Moon", that lit up my mind when I discovered space covers 50 years ago. That led to my getting involved with more carefully and thoughtfully following the space program and buying and reading books by astronauts and scientists.

My wife's maternal instincts flourished during her first pregnancy and the discovery that there were postage stamps which showed fairy tales kindled her interest in collecting stamps featuring fairytales, folk tales, legends and island mythology. But when she discovered the wealth of stories from around the world that she had never heard before, it struck another chord in wanting to know why stories like these were important enough that foreign governments honored them with postage stamps. That prompted her gene that guided her to do the kind of research she has done.

Share your thoughts on paper with Peter Elias. If you don't think that you can write, he can help put your thoughts down on paper. This could make many articles that would help us all get to know each other and our collecting interests. Once people know about what you collect, it would not be surprising that others will find items of interest to you that they will give to you or will offer to sell to you. I have benefitted many times by having others point me to items that would enhance my collections and have often found items that I picked up and gave to collectors I knew who collected these items. This is why the collectors who share their information are able to create exhibits to share with others. Let's hear from some of you on this topic of what you collect and how you got started. I know that I'm not the only member of the MCSC who would look forward to seeing several items like this in our upcoming newsletters.

## National Something Day: June 12 - Forklift Truck Safety Day

A forklift truck is useful tool used in all sorts of industries, especially in warehouses. Imagine having to cart pallets of products around a warehouse or construction site or loading/unloading a semi-trailer without one!



But given that you are hauling around a lot of weight (easily a ton in many cases), safety is an important concern! Thus, the ITA (Industrial Truck Association) has deemed June 12, 2018 the “Forklift Truck Safety Day”. This year is the 5th anniversary of this event and it included a special event (educational sessions) and talks in Washington DC.

The stamp that illustrates this is Hungary #1525 issued in 1964 and shows a forklift truck loading mail into a rail-car. Being able to handle a forklift truck safely does require training, something that I got at a previous job in Kentucky (see photo below).

Also important are safety features of the forklift truck itself, and the lack of one key safety feature is shown on the Hungarian stamp: there is no safety cage, leaving the lift operator very vulnerable and with no protection!



Of course, the aluminum foil “antlers” on the forklift truck that I am driving don’t really provide any safety features either ...

Denny Ludlow commented on last month’s auction and noted that more lots would be put up for sale at the June meeting.

For “**Where In The World**”, Gary McNamee led the group through clues to identify the tiny enclave of San Marino and the African nation of Nigeria.

Following a five-minutes **refreshment break**, Gene Atkinson discussed his odd collection of packaged stamp hinges. Interested in the different types of hinges seen in old collections, he has assembled nearly 150 different packs, boxes, dispensers, and tins representing collector use over a century. His interest has paralleled the American Philatelic Society sponsored study of the chemical properties of Dennison and other commercial hinges.

Beyond the nostalgia of the older products, the collection may in time help complete the analysis the APS has begun.

In “**Closing**”, gift certificates were claimed by Gary McNamee, Stanley Christmas, and David Stockbridge.




### Parody Elvis Stamp
