Furnace Creek

Since it is around 109°F at DFW Airport as I am writing this on July 21, I figured this is a "relevant" article! On July 4, 2001, I was in Las Vegas, and Annie and I took a day trip out to Death Valley. We stopped at Furnace Creek, which is about the only

place in Death Valley that has "traveler services", ranging from a campground, a store, a restaurant and even a post office (the Zip Code is 92328).

Furnace Creek is aptly named; the photo shows me in front of a thermometer that reads about 117°F (compared to only 113°F at the time of writing this now and 122°F scheduled for July 22). It definitely felt like standing in a blast furnace that day! Talk about making your

blood boil!

We had lunch at the Furnace Creek Restaurant, and I do remember having an excellent Portobello Mushroom burger!

I've been Death Valley several times in the past. One of my favorite trips was in early 1990, when an old college friend and I went for a "photo shoot" in Death Valley. While I shot some video in color on 8mm Video, all photos that I took were done as black & white negatives. One of my favorite photos is to the left. While color is great, black & white makes



black & white makes it look better in this case (not that I was trying to emulate Ansel Adams...); I even made this photo into a US custom stamp! I do recommend going to Death Valley though in the winter months ...

MCSC EXPO Meeting Minutes August 11, 2018

The MCSC EXPO Committee met at the Pizza Garden in Bedford at 11:00 AM on August 11, 2018. Present were EXPO Chairperson Ralph Poore, Treasurer Judy Christmas, and Committee members Stanley Christmas, Alliene Franklin, Rich Hildebrandt, Bob Weidman, Mike Smith and Skip Ely.

- <u>WELCOME</u> Ralph Poore opened the meeting by saying he will be extremely busy the next couple of months but will watch his email for any EXPO related items. He suggested the subject line say "MCSC EXPO" so that he will be sure to see it.
- PREVIOUS MINUTES The previous Expo meeting minutes
 were accepted without reading, except for a correction noted by
 Alliene Franklin. She said it was Stanley (not she) who suggested that cash be given instead of crystal for some awards
 (which she supported).
- <u>BOURSE</u> Tom Cunningham was unable to attend but sent an email summary of bourse status. He said all tables but one are sold, and he had alternatives for that. He said all dealer matters are under control and gave a detailed account of specifics.
- <u>AWARDS</u> Alliene Franklin showed a framed certificate Ray Cartier said he could prepare inexpensively instead of plaques. It was agreed to accept his offer.
- **BEGINNING COLLECTORS** Skip Ely said he was continuing to sort through donations for useful material for both the beginners and silent auction areas. He outlined a few things he was thinking about doing to help beginning collectors, including a sign that says, "Ask me about watermarks, tagging, soaking stamps", etc.
- <u>BANQUET</u> Rich Hildebrandt said he had sold about eleven tickets so far.

- <u>EXHIBITS</u> Stanley Christmas said all frames have been filled.
- <u>FINANCE</u> Judy Christmas said everything was in good shape.
- <u>REGISTRATION</u> Ralph Poore mentioned he had received a note from the Comfort Inn in Roanoke offering the same rate as the Comfort Inn in Grapevine. Stanley said he would include that information in the flyer to dealers and in the mail out.
- <u>JUDGES</u> Peter Elias has indicated previously that we have three judges confirmed.
- <u>LUNCHES</u> There was a discussion about having the club subsidize lunches for club volunteers. It was decided to table the issue until next year. Rich Hildebrandt said he could probably help with retrieving and distributing the lunches at the show.
- MIXTURE PICK Bob Weidman said he has tried to find some new suppliers for mix pick items, as some previous ones no longer seem to be in the business.
- MAIL OUT/PROGRAM Stanley said he needed to get with Tom for a list of dealers and their contact information for the program.
- **SECURITY** Mike Smith said we will have the same security detail as last year.
- <u>SILENT AUCTION</u> Skip Ely said he thought we had plenty
 of small material but wasn't sure we had any big-ticket items
 yet.
- <u>OUTSIDE SIGNS</u> A couple of options were discussed. Rich Hildebrandt said he might be able to do it if we can't find someone.
- EXPO CHECKLIST Ralph went through some of the summer items from the Master Expo Checklist. Only a few action items remained.

NEXT MEETING –A final Expo meeting was scheduled for October 6 at Dave's BBQ in Pantego. The meeting was adjourned at 12:10 PM.

Been There, Done That

Kilauea

I'm sure all of you have heard about the recent volcanic eruptions of Kilauea in Hawaii. Kilauea sits on the southern side of the big island of Hawaii. It is one of the more active volcanoes on the face of the earth and has been that way for a number of years. In fact, back in the 1840's, Kilauea became a tourist attraction and has been that way ever since. It is estimated that 2.6 millions people visit Kilauea each year.

Pat and I have been to Hawaii a number of times and have gone to the big island to see Kilauea at least twice. The first time we stayed in Kona or the west side of the island. We had a rental car and one day decided to drive around the island to see all of the sights. When we got to Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, it was late in the day, so we went back early the next day, which was a good idea because we spent the whole day there and still didn't get to see everything!

Hawaii Volcanoes National Park became the eleventh national park in the United States on August 1, 1916 when President Woodrow Wilson signed it into law. It was also the first national park in a U.S. territory (Hawaii did not become a state until 1960). Originally it was called Hawaii National Park. Renamed Hawaii Volcanoes Nation Park, it became a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987.

A World Heritage Site landmark or area is selected by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization having cultural, historical, scientific or other



significance and is legally protected by international treaties.

Been There, Done That

STEM

On April 6, 2018, the USPS issued a set of stamps honoring "STEM" - $\underline{\mathbf{S}}$ cience, $\underline{\mathbf{T}}$ echnology, $\underline{\mathbf{E}}$ ngineering & $\underline{\mathbf{M}}$ ath.

In 1985, I received my "Bachelor of Science" degree in Packaging Engineering from the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources at Michigan State University.

Yes, I know, most people have never heard of "Packaging Engineering". The Chemical, Civil, Electrical & Mechanical Engineering fields are much more well known. But each year, MSU has over 200 students graduating with a Bachelor Degree in this field, and some also with Masters & PhD degrees!

Packaging as a field that employs over a million people in this country. Remember, practically all goods we buy have to be "packaged" for retail & shipping. Someone has to design the packaging materials, the equipment to make the package; the equipment to fill the package, the labels and the graphics. Even legal aspects are obviously involved! It is a field that can take you anywhere and is a combination of several disciplines (including all four depicted on the STEM stamps).

In 1984, as part of an internship in Germany, I helped Clark Equipment (they make industrial equipment, such as the "Bobcat" loaders and excavators) save money in packaging material costs in their German warehouse from where they were shipping spare parts to Europe & Africa.

After analyzing what they were doing (using extremely thick & expensive triple-walled corrugated boxes in conjunction with steel straps which in turn cut into the cartons), I recommended that they switch to lighter cartons and "stretch wrap" them (which provides even pressure). They were skeptical at first, but a trial run convinced them!





USPS Deck Card: World War I

July 27, 2018 was the issue date for the latest USPS stamp honoring World War I.

Again I was lucky enough to be at the Plano post office on the "first day of issue" and get the "deck card", on which I then placed one of the stamps and had it postmarked, creating a nice "first day of issue" souvenir. All stamps are now generally released nationwide on the same day; the official first day of issue city was listed as Kansas City, MO.



It's difficult as it is to get these deck cards, as most post offices may only get one deck (which is normally100 panes of stamps, in this case only 50). The original press sheet consists of 6 panes, in this case, the stamps were from the "lower left" corner of the press sheet (see arrow). Getting a complete set of all 6 deck cards would be quite a challenge, even more so if all were postmarked on the first day of issue! Ready, set, collect!

PRESS RELEASE: Karen Cartier's Dragon Book

Karen's release of her newest book, *Dragon Lore*, at the APS Stampshow/National Topical Stamp Show, came as a surprise tie in to the show theme, *There Be Dragons*. The book opens with a

dozen factual pages on dragons, followed by 12 tales of Asian Dragon Lore. The balance of this book then centers on 18 tales of European Dragon Lore. Each of these stories is accompanied by color reproductions of eighty-one postage stamps which picture the tales from twenty-nine different countries.

The cover of this book is from an original 15 inch by 19 inch paper cut dragon, which was a gift to her husband by a couple from Taiwan who were friends of Ray's from when he worked at General Dynamics on the Taiwan Indigenous Defense Fighter contract. The design was meticulously cut out with razor blade knives from a variety of colors of paper.

Karen opened her book with comments about dragons, stating "There are the good, beneficial dragons that are represented in the Asian countries, as well as the vicious, demonic dragons from European countries". She points out the differences found in dragons in color, number of claws, numbers of legs or no legs and those that are winged, or are only found in the seas. She describes the power ascribed to dragons by monarchs who used dragons as their standards. Illustrations of different types of dragons help the viewer to better understand their roles in history, including, in the East: Qiglong; Zhulong; Huanglong; Xuanlong; Bailong; Lungwang; Fucanglong, Shenlong, Yinglong, and Dilong. In the Western lore she describes the: Wyverns; Amphiptere; Heraldic; Guivre; Vouivre, Serpentine, Lindworms and Basilisk.

Representatives of the U.S. Postal Service noticed that she had placed a row of the four new dragon stamps on the inside cover of a few of her new books for *First Day of Issue*

postmarks to celebrate the combined first day of their stamps and her book. The then had a USPS photographer take photos of her with her book for internal USPS publicity.



TV Philately: A Cure for Wellness

When watching TV, the miracle of the "||" (Pause) button allows us to see things in detail that we can't as part of a moving picture. This comes in real handy studying postal props used in movies and TV series.



has to retrieve the CEO of his company from a "wellness" facility at a remote location in the Swiss Alps.

Early in the movie there is a shot of an envelope received from the CEO. As usual, here the philatelic fun begins. Did the props department get it right? Let's analyze what is there.

At first glance, the envelope does appear to bear stamps from Switzerland. They are the Scott #507, 20 centime stamp featuring the Kreuzberge Alpstein mountains issued in 1969 and 2 of Scott#391, the 60 centime definitive stamps featuring the clock tower in Bern from 1960. While the stamps shown appear real, I think that they are copies, since the perforations at corners of the do not match how Swiss stamps are perforated, which is via comb, not line perforations.

Let's move on to the postmarks. The middle and right cancels are different in style (there would be no reason for that in real life). They are both difficult to read, but the right one does bear semblance to actual Swiss postmarks.



The left "postmark" isn't Postage Meter Stamp Catalog
one. It is a recreation of a Swiss postage meter, but the layout doesn't come close to any actually in use. It's similar to Pitney Bowes meters used in the 1980's to 1990's, but they do NOT have an "O" at the lower left corner, the Posthorns should be in the corners (not the center) and HELVETIA is never at the bottom of a meter!

The postage paid is incorrect, sFr 1.40 is shown, it should be sFr. 1.80. Even adding the fake meter value of sFr 1.20 doesn't make any sense. And the post office would not add a meter impression on the stamps! So yet again, they got it wrong!
