## New SSK & New Flag ATM Stamp

In April 2018, the USPS announced that it would be replacing all 2,843 SSK (self-service kiosks) in the USA, leaving them with 2,745 (after some adjustments for underutilized and new kiosks).

There are over 90 of these kiosks at post offices here in the Dallas / Ft. Worth area; I spoke with one of the contractor installing these and they said that they are installing 110 of them in North Texas and Oklahoma between now and November.

The first one installed in this area was at the Northwest Plano Post Office at Zip Code 75025; that was coincidentally one of the 10 original post offices that trial the kiosks (that are now being replaced) back in April 2012!

A photo of the new kiosk is shown to the left. It does have a more "modern" look that the old blue ones that it is replacing. It is supposed to be easier

supposed to be easier to use. While it does appear to be that in general, I found that the touch screens require more effort and the units are not as tall, so you are looking down at the screen rather than it being closer to eye level.

While a couple of kiosks were installed as early as April in other parts of the USA, the project seemed to have stalled out and was restarted in August.

Along with the new kiosks, the USPS released a new SSK Flag stamp (to be #CVP109), featuring a close-up view of the

flag (the older stamp, #CVP91) which had a sky in the background.

Unfortunately the installers do not seem to check the settings of the machine and all 4 machines that I visited in The Colony, Plano and Richardson printed the "USPS Eagle" as an error overprint on the flag design (both new and old designs!). Additionally, these settings cause the "Barcode Matrix" design (see below) to also print on the flag rather than on the separate "FOLD HERE" large postage labels.

It's been an exciting time; after several years of no major activity, finally some new stuff to play with and research! There are lots of details, and I hope to have an exhibit for EXPO 2019!

### Editor's Forum



## John Lennon First Day Deck Card

September 7 was the first day of issue of the new John Lennon stamp. I had asked a couple of days before the first day whether they could save me the deck card (as I usually don't end up at the post office until later in the afternoon). So this way I was able to get another nice first day of issue souvenir, and while the postmark isn't from the "official first day city", it is neverthe-less a first day cancel. These make nice collectible items, especially since there aren't going to be many of them around!



## Half Are ATM Stamps, Half are Postage Stamps

I recently received my quarterly issue of "Variable" from Ateeme in Spain. The stamps on the envelope were electronically cropped on the scan above.

While most people know these items as "ATM stamps", the top row of three of these six are actually "postage stamps". Since collector demand for these print-on demand (mostly by postal clerks) ATM stamps was high during those days (i.e.: 1992 to 2007), Correos (the Spanish Postal Service) decided to fully pre-print the stamps including the denomination as strips of three (with three different rates) starting in mid-2003. The reason being is that the clerks were constantly asked to manually print these for collectors, and thus they figured it would be less time consuming to have them fully pre-printed.

As fully pre-printed items, they are "postage stamps" not "ATM stamps". The Michel ATM catalog does list these (but it is after all an ATM catalog, not a postage stamp catalog), and technically, these should be listed in Scott's as they meet criteria for being postage stamps!

How to tell them apart: There is no machine number on the left and close examination the denomination shows that he printing is totally black and not comprised of individual dots.



The furthest distance I went to go to a stamp club meeting was on St. Vincent in the Caribbean in 2007. Luckily though, I did not witness a scene such as such shown below; that would have been frightening! Yet, stamp designers seem to like to depict such harrowing near-death airplane scenes on stamps!



## **Philatelic Supplies**

Most philatelic supplies (such as hinges, mounts and catalogs) generally have to be bought at dedicated stamp stores, although Hobby Lobby does have a very limited supply of stamps supplies.

However, there are other items that I use for philatelic purposes that can be bought elsewhere:

**<u>Binders</u>** - I use lots of generic binders to hold various specialty collections or exhibits. For smaller collections or exhibits, 1/2" binders will work; in other cases I had to go up to 3" binders.

The first place that comes to mind for binders is generally one of the main office supply stores (think Office Max, Office Depot or Staples). They have a wide variety of binders in all sorts of colors and sizes to meet your needs. But they can be expensive. I find that one of the least expensive places to get binders (as long as white works for you), is either Sam's Club or Costco. They have bundled sets of 1/2", 1" or other sizes, generally 6 per bundle. I just bought some 1/2" binders, and they cost only about \$1.44 each (including tax!).

Page Protectors - This is another item I need a lot of when preparing exhibits (it's really a "must-have" item for exhibits). Again, you find these at the office supply stores, but again, I went to the warehouse clubs. Strangely enough, Costco didn't have any page protectors recently, but Sam's Club did and had both "clear" and "non-glare" types. I prefer the clear ones, as the "non-glare" ones don't quite let you see items as well. For 250 protectors, I paid less than \$10 (including tax).

## From the President's Desk

One of the situations which many stamp collectors encounter over the years is that the pursuit of their collecting interests becomes stymied. It could be that everything on their remaining want lists is too expensive, or is very elusive. I've run across that problem a few times during my collecting decades and am there once again at this time. In 1967 I had finally acquired mint copies of every US stamp from 1924 onward along with some used copies of a few earlier stamps. The idea of doing fly-speck hunting on all of the Washington Head stamps held no interest for me and along with that, many of the stamps from 1923 and before that were far above my low salary grade for me to obtain.

But I liked the hobby and started collecting stamps from the United Nations. Aside from #29, all of their issues were low cost items and it didn't take long until I'd found all of the issued stamps and was just waiting for new ones to come out each year. That became boring.

Then I discovered two philatelic collecting areas which I'd never before been exposed: Topical Collecting of one or more subjects in which I had an interest, and Astrophilately: collecting a postmarked history of space exploration. Fifty years ago I started collecting space covers and where possible, the soon to be historical signatures of inventors, engineers, astronauts and cosmonauts. The prices in 1968 were low and the signatures were free. And, as I learned more and more about the space program I began to send snippets of information that I had discovered, to the editor of the Space Unit journal, "The Astrophile". Eventually, I found myself writing entire articles about various facets of the hobby and I learned how to concentrate my time, and money, to individual aspects of that hobby, starting with launch dated covers and Primary Recovery Ship covers.

With no schooling in writing, I learned some of the tricks of the trade and went on to write two books and dozens of articles on this subject of my fascination. As my collections grew, my want lists were reduced to where, just a few years ago I noticed that I was now excited if I could find just one cover from my want list at any show which I attended. So in addition to writing about my hobby, I started verbally sharing information about space covers with others. Now, ten years into retirement a huge segment of my hobby time is spent doing things which I'd never thought of before, such as writing about my hobby, speaking about it, and winning gold medals with my exhibits. It's taken 50 years to get to this point but it keeps me out of the Bingo parlors and is a lot more fun. We now travel to other shows and I've come to know and meet people who attend different shows as well.

Meanwhile my topics of Jules Verne, Jacques Cartier, Monsters, and the aircraft built in Ft. Worth have filled out my topical interests. My post retirement days are filled with doing things that I want to do and these avenues of collecting have kept me active and interested.

So if you are reaching one of those points in collecting stamps that leaves you with very little left to find or do, why not consider beginning to specialize in a topic which ties to one or more of your personal interests? The American Topical Association has checklists of stamps on over 1,250 topics, courtesy of my wife who spent over five years researching every topic she could find by going over every page in the Scott's Catalogs. The checklists that she has compiled will vastly improve your ability to locate stamps that tie into your own special interest(s).

## Croatia To Slovenia

The picture above was taken on December 12, 2017. I took it from Slovenia looking back across the border into Croatia. The people in the photo were part of our tour group and they are on the Croatian side, getting their passports stamped so that they can cross over into Slovenia. The bus in the background was our tour bus that us through the four countries that we visited on our Balkan vacation.

What is interesting is that both Croatia and Slovenia are members of the European Union, which is an economic and political partnership between 28 of the European nations. Once someone crosses the border into a member of the EU and has their passport stamped, it is not necessary to have it stamped again if going directly into another member country.

What didn't make sense was that when we were on our way to Dubrovnik, Croatia: we were in Croatia and had to pass through a very short section of Bosnia along the coast. We stopped at the border. Our tour guide and bus driver got off the bus and went to the border guards. We did not have to exit the bus and we did not have our passports stamped.

A few miles down the road, we came to the border with Croatia again. And again our driver got off the bus. We did not have to either and again our passports were not stamped. Bosnia is not a member of the European Union, so we should have had to get off the bus and have our passports checked and stamped. The same thing happened when we went across the border in to Montenegro and back again into Croatia. Montenegro is also not an EU member nation. The only way that I can explain it is that these border guards are government employees.

By the way, we crossed borders ten times on that trip!

The stamp to the right, which features the flag of Slovenia is Scott#458, issued on May 23, 2001.



## Meeting Minutes for Granbury August 28, 2018

#### **WELCOME:**

• With Brian Smith presiding, seventeen members and guests gathered for the August 28 meeting of the Lake Granbury Branch, Mid-Cities Stamp Club. The group meets every fourth Tuesday at 7 pm in the Bentwater Activities Center, 1800 West Emerald Bend Court, in Granbury, Texas.

#### **SHOW & TELL:**

- Member Lloyd Willis circulated a cover from Australia on which the sender had thoughtfully taped over all the collectible stamps.
- Denny Ludlow had an 1881 receipt from a Liverpool auction as well as some World War II covers and censor items.
- Gene Atkinson had examples of interesting covers ruined by over zealous postal employees with Sharpie pens.
- Alliene Franklin noted that the club still needed participants to submit one-page exhibits for this year's EXPO, the deadline set for the October club meeting.
- Brian Smith wondered why so few were interested in Cinderella issues like those from the South Moluccas or South Kasai (a part of the Congolese rebellion linked to the Katanga province).

#### WHERE IN THE WORLD:

 Gary McNamee's quiz got as far as noting that first stamps were issued in 1870 in Reis denominations, when the members guessed correctly he was referring to Angola.

#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS:**

The club needs a librarian to care for and circulate its collection of reference material. For the time being, Gene Atkinson will provide a home for the materials until a permanent solution is found.

Following a refreshments BREAK, Alliene Franklin conducted the PROGRAM on materials from World Wars I and II. She observed that in the "Great War" of 1917-1918 in the United States, there was no enforced rationing, only voluntary observance of "meatless" and "wheatless" days which nevertheless reduced domestic consumption of essential foodstuffs by some fifteen percent. However, in the 1940s, Britain was far more dependent upon imports of food, and when German Uboats threatened supplies His Majesty's Government instituted controlled distribution of numerous critical commodities such as bacon, sugar, butter and more. Some rationing lasted until 1954. In the U. S. after December, 1941, the first rationing extended from tires to automobiles to a list of civilian items. As Alliene discussed the various steps to reduce consumption and displayed ration books and stamps for different categories of use, members offered up personal recollections of the war years.

At the <u>CONCLUSION</u> of the program, door prizes of club gift certificates went to Edith Willis, Gene Atkinson, and Julie Rimmer.

The <u>NEXT MEETING</u> will be Tuesday, September 25 when Ken Aldridge will discuss "Stamping and Golf." Meet and eat begins at Palio's Pizza Cafe, 3710 E. Highway 377, at 5 PM. 
The USPS recently announced that they will be issuing a set of 10 stamps commemorating 50 years of "Hot Wheels" toy cars.

The new issue ceremony will take place in Ft. Worth on Saturday, Sept. 29 at 10 AM at the

Texas Motor Speedway in conjunction with the Good Guys 26th Summit Racing Lone Star Nationals – also known for it's Hot Rod & Customs car show, which brings in several thousand hot rods and cars. So presumably the attendance will be good. Lots of car gals & guys. Hopefully some may start collecting stamps – lots of stamps have featured various classic cars over the years... It would be neat to have a 1-frame topical cars-on-stamps exhibit at the opening ceremony to give the non-collectors a chance to see what is possible to collect!

General admission to the car show itself is normally \$20 per person (\$17 if you buy tickets online earlier); I don't know if the USPS ceremony will be inside Motor Speedway or not. Doubtful that they'll waive the entry fee, but I'll need to try and call someone at the USPS to ask about this.

Coincidentally, one of the 10 Hot Wheels stamps features a car called "Purple Passion". I was at a toy show in Dallas on September 1st, and I won a Hot Wheels "Purple Passion" die-cast car as a door prize! The car is copyright dated 1989 on the bottom and the packaging has a 1991 date. It has been produced around 100 different times since 1989. At first, I couldn't quite tell based on the chart at <a href="http://hotwheels.wikia.com/wiki/Purple Passion">http://hotwheels.wikia.com/wiki/Purple Passion</a> whether mine is the 1990 or 1993 version. Mine says "Toy #2173" and "Collector no. 87"on the cardboard packaging, that would make it the first 1990 edition. But then, it has "yellow flames outlined in blue" (versus the 1990 version which has "light green scallops outlined in dark green on the sides), and that would make it the 1993 version, which is also shown as having



a beige interior, which mine does. Hmm, so what do I have? Most likely the 1993 version... I will keep it in "NIB" (new in box) condition for now; that's similar to "MNH" for us stamp collectors!

In any case, as a stamp collector, it will be nice to have a new issue ceremony taking place here in the DFW area, and hopefully some of the MCSC members will be in attendance!

So here's a neat collecting activity: collect the various Hot Wheels cars that are going to be on the stamps!
