My wife will testify that I spend a lot of time online. I am an information junkie and I love to collect information about stamp collecting. It is amazing what you can find when you become proficient with

Google or whatever search engine you use to guide you through cyberspace. Here's an example. I went into Google and typed "philatelic books free download". The first result of this search was an APS reference promoting expert authentication of stamps, not exactly what I was looking for.

Next, a site called "stormthecastle.com" showed up. This site provides several free books for your downloading pleasure, and there is no charge to glean the copies for your own use. Most are downloadable as PDF (Portable Document Format) files, with which most of you should be familiar by now.

The third site on the Google results listing was "davidsaks.com". This site contains more philatelic literature than I have found anywhere in my searches. The website is beautifully designed with many pertinent references and illustrations to make your visit extremely enjoyable. Also included are links which show up on the right hand side of the screen which provide even more information and tidbits about David Saks.

I noticed there was a button at the lower right hand corner which said "David's Online Click to Chat". I couldn't resist the urge and clicked on the link. David actually came online and we had a nice chat about his website and he told me he was the APS ambassador for the Memphis Stamp Collectors Society. His website is indicative of a man who loves the hobby and is very passionate about philately. Also on the site are some videos he has recorded to provide assistance to people who might be looking for information. I highly recommend you take a look at davidsaks.com.

5¢ Bippies

5¢ "Bippies" are now available from **photostamps.com**

(part of SDC - Stamps.com). I'm sure that your first question is: "what is a bippy"? Well, in SDC-speak, it is a small make-up rate stamp that they make available when US postage rates change. In the past 10 years or so, most US 1st class postage rate changes were only either 1¢ or 2¢ increases, but this year, the first class rate jumped by 5¢, from 50¢ to 55¢.



The "bippies" (and yes, that is what they call them at SDC - see the close-up of the mailing label below) are printed on 8.5" x 11" self-adhesive sheets;

each stamp is straight-line die-cut with slightly rounded corners. The stamps have very wide gutters between them, easily allowing space for another stamp, so instead of the 40 bippies per sheet, they

could easily have fit 80 of them.

So why the name "bippies"? Who knows. It was originally a "non-sense" word, used in the phrase "you bet your sweet bippy", most likely referring to a body part, and was popularized by the Rowan & Martin "Laugh-In" TV show.

<u>TV Philately:</u> The Old Man & The Gun

I always try to keep an eye out for stamps & covers when they are shown on movies & TV shows, even if they flash up on the screen only very briefly. In a movie theatre you can't pause the movie, but at home, we can! Use your remote control to pause and slowly advance the images until you can see details and use a digital camera to take a photo of the screen to see if they got it right!

In late January (as I am writing this), I had just rented the 2018 movie "The Old Man & The Gun", starring Robert Redford in what is supposed to be his last movie. The movie is the "based on a true story" about <u>Forrest Tucker</u>, a bank robber that got away with many robberies and even had 18 successful escapes from prisons (& 12 unsuccessful ones). The movie takes place mostly around DFW and other Texas locations.

In the "philatelic scene" in question, Dallas detective John Hunt is at his desk going through some inbound mail; shown is an envelope that he picks up and looks at briefly.



At first glance, it looks ok, but it isn't. The stamp isn't really discernible (due to the pause button being in the way), and the cancel is not correct. This is <u>not</u> what a 4-bar killer cancel looks like (1): the 4 bars are normally immediately to the right of the circle. And it looks as if they were at one point, but someone cropped the bars off (remnants are still visible) and put the 4 bars much further to the right (plus the length of the bars is too long). The year date of 1981 is correct, as the movie takes place during that year, however, the day is marked out, and the city name isn't quite readable (NOTACE?, TX).

AND: before John Hunt grabbed the envelope shown above, it was seen upside down 6 seconds earlier in

a pile of envelopes on his desk (see photo to the right). What I noticed immediately was the white envelope to the right. It shows a spray-on machine cancel with a date of what appears to be 2008 (2) and a flag stamp (3) that appears to be Scott #4229 (or #4233, #4237, #4241 or #4245 - all with the same design, just different perforations) and which was issued in 2008.

So, why was mail from 27 years in the future shown? Additionally, spray-on cancels weren't even used until 2006! And not only that, but why is

MCSC BOARD MEETING MINUTES Saturday, January 26, 2019

A brief MCSC Board Meeting was held at Dave's BBQ in Pantego on Saturday, January 26, 2019, at 12:30 PM. Attending were President-Elect Rich Hildebrandt, outgoing President Ray Cartier, Treasurer Judy Christmas, Second Vice President Gene Pfretzschner, Secretary Skip Ely, and Board Members Peter Elias and Alliene Franklin. Also in attendance were club members Ken Aldridge and Stanley Christmas.

Skip Ely began the meeting by giving an update on membership renewals. Judy Christmas distributed the latest budget figures. Peter Elias talked about the newsletter printing costs and appropriate adjustments were made in the budget figures.

Skip Ely said he would prefer to email the meeting announcements on the weekends prior to meetings. No one objected. He also said he would like to update the printed copy of the newsletter. Again, no one objected.

A discussion ensued about the frequency of purchasing Scott catalogs. As past librarian, Rich said they have not been used that much in the past year or so. Finally, a motion was made and approved to purchase a new Scott Classic Specialized catalog this year and every four years thereafter. It was also decided to purchase a new U.S. Specialized catalog this year, and every other year thereafter. The six-volume worldwide Scott catalogs will be purchased next year and every other year thereafter (or until a different schedule is decided).

Skip Ely distributed a sales report and said he had resumed receiving APS circuits at the request of some members, but only February through September. He talked about trying to offer some of the common excess stamps in club inventory to members at heavily discounted prices in attempt to offset the APS mailing costs, and to let members benefit from some nice pieces to expand or improve their collections.

Rich said that the Constitution & By-Laws of the club say that we should audit the treasury periodically and that he would try to recruit a small team to accomplish that goal. The meeting adjourned at 1:30 PM.

Think About the EXPO Theme

Lately it seems to be getting more difficult to come up with a "theme" for our EXPO. In the past we had always chosen a current issue USA stamp and our theme & cachet around that. But generally we didn't get many exhibits (meaning 1frame or multi-frame) that related to that theme. Why? Well, for one thing it's difficult for most people to create a brand new 1-frame or multi-frame exhibit from scratch on a new topic in such a short amount of time (less than 9 months).

<u>So why not try something else</u>: pick a topic / theme, but limit it to just our 1-page and 4-page mini-exhibits and come up with a special award for that (outside of what "regular" mini-exhibits can earn). It should be much easier to come up with 1 or 4 pages on fairly short notice than a fullfledged topical or thematic exhibit. And this should also hopefully get a few more members involved in exhibiting!

What topic or theme should we choose? Well, to toss a suggestion into the hat: how about something similar to what the Houston show does (which is generally a color); perhaps a letter of the alphabet or a number (those alone should give us 36 years of show themes!), or perhaps a "Been There - Done That" type of subject.

The mini-exhibits would be judged on how well they relate to that number or letter (or other "theme"). Perhaps do separate judging for 1-page versus 4-page.

This would also allow some members to start exhibiting: a 1 or 4-page exhibit should be easily doable (and to a degree is just a slightly expanded "show & tell" item), versus the arduous task of compiling 16, 32, 48, etc pages with lots and lots of research in a very short period of time.

The regular mini-exhibits (i.e.: those that are NOT based on the show theme) would be judged separately.

What do YOU think? Gather your thoughts on this subject and bring it up at the next EXPO meeting on March 2.

The La Bourdonnais Statue By Pat & Bob Weidman

Betrand-Francois Mahe de La Bourdonnais was a French naval officer who was born on February 11, 1699 and died on November 10, 1753. He was also an administrator in the service of the French East India Company.



The picture is of a statue of him in Port Louis, the capital of Mauritius; it was taken back in 1998 while Pat and I were vacationing in Mauritius.

After two years working in the service of the Portuguese Viceroy, he returned to French service. That was in 1935 when he was appointed governor of the Isle de France (now Mauritius) and the Ile de Bourbon (now Reunion), both

of which were colonies of France at the time. Mauritius is now an independent nation. Reunion became an integral part of the French Republic under a law effective January 1, 1975.

The stamp with the statue of de la Bourdonnais (spelled LABOUR-DONNAIS on the stamp) on it is from a set of fifteen definitives issued from 1953 to 1954; it is Scott #257.

Been There, Done That

The Römer

September In 1999, Annie & I took a brief trip to Europe with the flight arriving early in the morning in Frankfurt/ Main (FRA) via London. Prior to heading off to Trier, we briefly visited Stamp scans courtesy of Otto Bergman Frankfurt's

"Altstadt" (i.e.: "Old Town"), where we took a selfie on a bench in the square (photo #1).

This area all looks very historical in nature (photo #2). Which it is, BUT, in 1945 (photo #3), most of these buildings were simply shells after the Allied bombings pretty much destroyed Frankfurt. It all looked a bit better in 1947 (photo #4) as Frankfurt was being rebuilt.

So what exactly is the "Römer"? It is the middle building (with the 3 large doors) and is Frankfurt's most famous building and has been its Rathaus ("City Hall") for 600 years. The Römer merchant family sold it (along with a second building) to the city in 1405. You can read more about it on Wikipedia at http://en.wikipeida.org/wiki/Römer.

The stamps at top (Scott# 634 & 639) show the Römer and are part of a definitive series from 1948-1951.
