

## National Something Month: <u>Financial Literacy</u> By Peter Elias

Reading the April 28 issue of the Dallas Morning News, I found out that April was "Financial Literacy Month" in the USA. Since it seems that many people do not

have a good grasp on financial literacy (especially youth), in 2003, the US Congress showed its support by asking George W. Bush to declare April to be "Financial Literacy for Youth Month".

Several states have also declared this as a "month", including Texas, which declared it by <u>proclamation</u> from Texas Governor Greg Abbott on March 20, 2018.

So, "declarations" aside, I personally believe it is important for everyone to have "financial literacy", at the least the basics. Most people don't need to be able to decipher a corporation's annual financial statement and know about EBIT's ("earnings before interest and taxes), but they should know some of the basics to allow them to know how the world works (financially) and to practice their own finances in a "healthy" fashion, things that amongst others includes:

- Budgeting (i.e.: income vs. spending and how to stay ahead of it).
- Balancing a check book (for those that still rely on a "check book, but if anything, how to reconcile a bank statement).
- How does "credit" (i.e.: loans, credit cards, etc) work?
- The impact of paying interest on purchases.
- The impact of compounding of interest on savings.
- Saving for the future.
- Living within ones means (and therein lies a really big problem!).
- What do things "really" cost (i.e.: Does the store make money selling an item for 75%-off and learning about the "food chain" of products, from "raw materials" to "manufacturing" to "distribution" to "retail sales").

Unfortunately, many of the above items are not taught in schools (although it is starting to happen). Many parents can't teach the above to their children since they don't understand this themselves.

My dad said to avoid buying on credit and pay cash if possible (although buying a house & buying/leasing a car is making that difficult for many people and you get on the never-ending-treadmill of making payments...). I do use credit cards for practically every purchase when possible, but only to maximize airline miles and hotel points, things which save me many thousands of dollars on vacations, BUT, I have not paid a penny in credit card interest since the early 1990's. I learned my lesson!


## **Editor's Forum**

Since full-fledged exhibits (16+ pages) are difficult to put together in just a couple of months, I figured that it would be easier to do a theme-based exhibit as 1 or 4 pages.

A 1 or 4-page mini-exhibit can still tell a story, albeit a short one, and a 1-page mini-exhibit is not much more than a "show & tell". So, how many of you can come up with a 1-page miniexhibit that relates to "Railroading"? Have you ever taken a train trip,

especially one that might have a stamp to go with it? Maybe a tourist "steam locomotive" trip such as the ones offered in east Texas?

## MCSC EXPO MINUTES May 4, 2019

The MCSC Expo committee members met at Angelo's in Pantego at 11:00 A.M. on May 4, 2019. In attendance were Ralph Poore (Committee Chairperson), Stanley Christmas, Judy Christmas Alliene Franklin, Peter Elias, Ken Wills, Anne Moxley, Tom Turner, Tom Cunningham, Kathryn Stacie, Ray Cartier, Karen Cartier, Ken Aldridge, Rick Howell and Skip Ely. Ralph expressed his appreciation for the excellent attendance.

Ralph referenced the minutes of the previous EXPO meeting in March. A motion was made and seconded to accept them and passed by unanimous vote.

Ralph then mentioned our theme for this year (Railroading), and briefly covered some applicable train organizations and clubs that might be interesting in attending the EXPO.

The next item of business was to go through the EXPO committees for applicable actions. The following issues were discussed:

- Awards Peter Elias suggested we have an additional one to four-page judged exhibit on our theme with a monetary award. After some discussion, the suggestion was approved with a \$25 Gift Certificate being the award.
- Bourse Tom Cunningham said he had received checks from thirteen dealers so far.
- Cachets Ralph said that Diana Davis had expressed interest in making a cachet for the Expo.
- Exhibits Anne Moxley said she had mailed exhibit notices and applications out and received replies from seven people for about 35 frames.
- **Publicity** Tom Cunningham asked for about 100 flyers to be offered at the TSDA Bourse in June. Ralph mentioned that the Grapevine Visitor's office had agreed to publicize our EXPO last year but never did. He asked we try to follow up more closely with them this year.
- Signs Ralph said we needed three new outdoor signs this year. Stanley Christmas agreed to make them.
- Silent Auction Ken Wills said that we didn't have many items so far this year. Skip Ely and Tom Turner agreed to go through some of the donated material from previous years to see what might be used for this year.
- Transportation (of frames and cabinets to and from the storage unit) - Tom Cunningham emphasized the importance of having these delivered promptly at 5:00 PM., so that the dealers can have access to loading dock by 5:30 PM. It was suggested that we investigate alternatives in case our current arrangement does not permit an assurance to that effect.
- Volunteers It was suggested that we include a line item in the agenda addressing our volunteer sheets.
- All others committee chair had no issues to bring up or were not in attendance.

The next EXPO meeting was scheduled for Saturday, August 31, 2019 at 11:00 AM, again at Angelo's.

The meeting was adjourned about 12:40 PM.



Tribute to a Life Well-Lived

On April 23, 2019, the world lost it's oldest living monarch, Grand Duke Jean of Luxembourg at the age of 98. The Grand Duke lived through some of Europe's most troubling times and his later life is well-documented in philately. Jean was born January 5,





Luxembourg, the son of Grand Duchess Charlotte and Prince Felix of Bourbon-Parma. He attended primary school in Lux-

Catholic boarding school in the U.K. On his 18<sup>th</sup> birthday in 1939, he was given the title "Hereditary Grand Duke", recognizing his title as heir apparent.



On May 10, 1940, Hitler's troops

invaded Luxembourg, beginning a four-year occupation. Fortunately, the royal family, having been warned the night before, succeeded in escaping to Paris for refuge, only to be forced to flee France only a few weeks later. The family sought refuge in the United States and rented an estate in Brookville, New York.



In November of 1942, Jean joined the British Army as a volunteer in the Irish Guards and was commissioned as a lieutenant on July 30, 1943, and promoted to captain in 1944. He landed at Normandy on June 11, 1944 and took part in the Battle for Caen and the liberation of Brussels. On Sept. 10, 1944, he took part in the liberation of Luxembourg and later the invasion of Germany at Arnheim. He relinquished his commission in the British Army in 1947, however, after the war from 1984 until his abdication he served as Colonel of the Regiment of the Irish Guards, often riding in uniform behind

Queen Elizabeth II during the Trooping the Colour, a celebration normally occurring for the Queen's birthday, and other official sanctions.

Jean became Grand Duke of Luxembourg on Nov. 12, 1964 when his mother Grand Duchess Charlotte abdicated, and upon his ascension, became a General of the Armed Forces of Luxembourg.

During his illustrious reign of Luxembourg, Jean is credited with transforming Luxembourg from a minor industrial contributor into an international financial center. In 1986, he was awarded the Charlemagne Prize in Aachen for his efforts towards European inte-

gration. President Georges Pompidou of France stated, "If Europe had to choose a hereditary president, it would certainly be the Grand Duke of Luxembourg."

Grand Duke Jean's legacy is well documented in philately with many stamps being issued in his honor as shown nearby.

April 29, 2015, 1st time in the history of 145 yrs organized baseball, no fans allowed at Baltimore, MD home game of Chicago White Sox vs. the Baltimore Orioles. Ban due to several days of rioting over the death of a black male during his arrest by officers of the Baltimore Police Dept.

Pictured is a special event cover that I created and had postmarked on April 29, 2015. Luckily I read about the "No fans" game the day before and threw two covers together with a *Baltimore Oriole* stamp and a *Take Me Out To The Ball Game* Stamp. I ran them to the Post Office mail deposit box and kept my fingers crossed that the cancel would be light and actually occur on April 29. Both turned out okay.

On April 12, 2015 Baltimore resident Freddie Gray, Jr., a 25 year old black male, was injured during his arrest by six Baltimore Police Officers. He died one week later from severe spinal injuries. Over the next several days, residents rioted to show support for charging the officers. They were eventually charged and a little over one year later the charges were dropped. It was during these riots that authorities decided to go ahead with a baseball game between the Baltimore Orioles and the Chicago White Sox, but not allowing any fans into the game.

Baltimore won that game, 8 to 2, in a crisp 2 hour and 3 minute game. By the way, that game also occurred on my birthday!

So who was "Little Mo"? She was Maureen Connolly Brinker, a famous US tennis player who was the top ranked tennis player in the world from 1951 to 1954 and won the "Grand Slam" (Australian Open, French Open, Wimbledon and the US Championships) in 1953. Her career came to an abrupt end in 1954 due to a horse riding accident. She married Norman Brinker (who was a part of the US equestrian at the 1952 Summer Olympics) in 1955. They lived in Dallas and had two daughters, Cindy & Brenda.

The stamp ceremony was well attended, my guess would be 200 to 300 people, most of which were family members & employees of the MCB (Maureen Connolly Brinker) Tennis Foundation and people from SMU. Eldest daughter Cindy runs the MCB.

It was a really nice ceremony and lasted approximately 1 hour. I did videotaped the entire ceremony (which was also streamed live at the time). All visitors received a first day cancelled envelope and a Little Mo stamp pin and program. After the ceremony, there was a reception with light snacks and autograph signing by the first day issuance dignitaries. On the left you see probably the ONLY known copy of a Deck Card with both the first day cancel AND autographed by Cindy Brinker Simmons!

While I saw several Dallas stamp club collectors, unfortunately I did not see anyone else from the Mid-Cities Stamp Club.

## You Got Pig

The title is a literal translation of the German phrase "Da hast Du Schwein gehabt". It means that "you got lucky", "you got off the hook", "you dodged a bullet", "you lucked out" and similar phrases.

But where does this phrase come from? According to the German Wikipedia Website (see link <u>here</u>), one theory is that it comes

from a way of talking during a card game in the 16th Century when the "Ass" (Ace) was called a "Sau" (Pig). Whoever drew the highest Ace thus had luck. A second theory said that the Rathaus (City Hall) of Münden was often subject to floods; and one of the many paintings depicts a raft where the citizens were trying to save their belongings, one of which was a pig, thus, they who were able to save their pigs were considered to be doing well (lucky) after a catastrophe.

Swiss Post issued a 100 centime "Lucky Pig" stamp in early 2019.


world country. Closest I came to a philatelic activity was to buy a few post cards to save for my collection.


On our trip to Switzerland back in 1989, Pat and I went over to the town of Montreux, which is located on the northern shore of Lac Leman (what we call Lake Geneva). To get there, we took the train, which was the Orient Express (see Stamping Around issue from December 2017). While there, we toured the Chillon Castle, which sits near the train tracks.

The castle is situated between the Swiss mountains Lake Geneva, which separates Switzerland (on the southwestern part) from France. The castle is over 850 years old, dating all the way back to 1150 when it was mentioned in the Council of Savoy.

In the 1536 it was taken over by the Bernese who controlled it until the Vaudois Revolution in 1798. Restoration on the castle started back at the end of the 19th century and has been ongoing ever since.
